INCLUSIVITY IN ACTION AT WSIJ25

We spoke to the Rainbow Hub about what they are doing during this year's WSIJ camp.

The Rainbow Hub is headed by Jack, who is the UK team lead for LGBTQ inclusion for the Scouts, and Abbie, who is part of the inclusion lead for Girl Guiding Sussex West county.

They said that the Rainbow Hub's first role is to promote diversity and inclusion, but they are also here to offer a safe place for LGBTQ+campers.

Abbie explained: "We want to make sure that the presence is here both for the young members to be seen and feel heard, but also for the adult members to be able to have a conversation about anything within the spectrum." Jack added: "Everyone can come down and it's just a nice safe space for everyone to chill out."

Abbie added: "We've had quite a few young people come up to us and say how exciting it is to feel seen in a Guiding and Scouting setting."



They added that another aspect of their role in camp is to provide a neutral third party to go to who is not your parent or your leader.
