MORNING MAGIC AT WSIJ

Every morning at WSIJ begins with a unique and unforgettable blend of cultures and energy! As the first rays of sunlight stretch over the camp on Wednesday morning, the sound of bagpipes drifts through the air. HOW TO MAKE A DRAGON

Start with Imagination

Sketch a rough plan of your dragon.

Find Your Base

Source an old electric wheelchair—this will provide the motor and frame.

Build the Structure

Create a steel frame to shape and support the body. Attach the wheelchair's motor and frame to this structure.

Add Key Components

Neck: Use a stainless steel tube to support the head and channel smoke to the nostrils.

Tail: Form it using an old fishing rod.

Wings: Repurpose tent poles to create wing frames. Head & Legs: Carve them from scrap material and insulate as needed. Neck Form: Use netting and spray foam to give shape.

Mechanics & Motion

Use the electric wheelchair seat ram to move the head and wings.

Finishing Touches

Cover the entire body in spray foam for texture.

Attach lights to the eyes and mouth for dramatic effect.

Borrow a smoke machine for realistic smoke breathing.

Make spines using pool noodles for a dragon-like silhouette.

Paint the whole structure red and name your dragon "Scrappy".
